



In November, all Computing students (all students in KS3 and all students who have selected GCSE Computer Science in Year 10 and Year 11) took part in the annual Bebras computational thinking challenges. These challenges are organised by the University of Oxford alongside the Raspberry Pi foundation and are undertaken by 400,000 students in the UK each year and over 3 million worldwide.

Students were presented with 18 online puzzles and were given a 45 minute timed session to see how many they could correctly complete independently. Students could achieve Merit or Distinction certificates if they perform well.

The puzzles were received extremely well and students had a great time decomposing the problems and trying to work out the answers using their computational thinking skills that we have been covering in lessons. Results will be out soon!


## **HAIL Society**

# ERA SPORTING HEROES

I am an intermediate horse rider and individual showjumper and have been riding for 4 years.

Also loves Netball

& Rounders

I train around 4-5 times a week. Some will be focused on fitness where I will do 40 minutes worth of canter work and hill work and some will be stamina where I will be land based doing lunging work, canter work around the arena on a horse. The standard of competition is really high and sometimes opponents will cheat by bringing affiliated ponies which isn't allowed.

In the future, I really want to compete at International level, in order to do this I will need to find the right horse and get more experience riding other horses as every horse is unique and different, I will need to make it through qualifiers where the FEI will select me to progress to the national or international team. Selection may be based on the approach you have with the animals and the results across previous competitions.

I have achieved in the top 3 places for nearly all competitions I have entered so far and even competed at Grassroots Championships at Arena UK. Ros Canter was part of the GB Team in eventing and is passionate about her sport, she isn't from a wealthy background and has worked hard to get to where she is and I would love to ride alongside her.

I ride for the following 3 clubs: Caverswall and District **Riding Club, Knightly Riding Club and Ashwood** Equestrian.







My most memorable moment was qualifying for Grassroots championships because I have been trying for the whole season. I qualified in May last year and I am going to compete against top horses around the country.

# **Universities in Focus**

University in focus: The University of Staffordshire

This edition, our 'University in focus' will be our very own University of Staffordshire! Previously known as Staffordshire university, it has gone through a rebranding process this year. According to Professor Martin Jones, vice-chancellor and chief executive the decision to change is about more than just a name. It encapsulates their vision for the future and the endless possibilities that education can unlock.

Lectures, teachers and staff at The University of Staffordshire are very proud of the work they, and their students do. For over a century they have been empowering individuals who, in turn, have transformed society across Staffordshire and beyond. They are proud that their roots run deep in the heart of the region, and our impact resonates far beyond our borders, acting as a beacon of knowledge, innovation, and opportunity. The University of Staffordshire says the new brand strategy is centered around the theme of 'possibility realised' and 'celebrates diversity, inclusion, and opportunity'.

This rebranding also coincided with the appointment of Major Levison Wood as Chancellor of the university. Levison, who grew up just down the road in Forsbrook, Blythe Bridge spent several years as a Regular Officer in the British Parachute Regiment where he served in Afghanistan fighting against Taliban insurgents in Helmand and Kandahar. He is famous however for his career as a best-selling author, explorer and photographer and, it was in recognition of this, that he was made an Honorary Doctor of Staffordshire University in 2017. To honour his new role he was installed in a special ceremony which took place this year, on May 1st...... Staffordshire day! In addition to this role, Levison is an elected Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, the Explorers Club and is an ambassador of Unicef. His expeditions across continents have also been the subject television documentaries, including walking the length of the river Nile, the Himalayas and all of central America.

The University of Staffordshire currently offers over 300 different courses, to over 11,000 students! Their most popular courses are Art and Design, Games design and development courses, as well as Criminology and Drama. In fact, the university's 'Games Institute' has won the 'Excellence in University/College – Industry Collaboration' category at the TIGA Games Education Awards. This award recognises the introduction of industry-led mock interviews to help prepare final year students for their future careers, and adds to their success as the university was ranked 1st in the UK and 5th in Europe by GAMEducation which recognises educational institutions with the highest employability, and the top student portfolios in video games education. According to the university's website, the annual tuition fee for undergraduate students studying full-time in 2024/25 is currently £9,250.

The month of November is an incredibly significant time in British, European and World History as it is Remembrance day.

As an academy and a community, every year, we come together to take part in the two-minute silence at 11am, to commemorate the Armistice and end of World War One. We wore our poppies with pride to show support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterans and their families. It represents all those who lost their lives on active service, from the beginning of the First World War right up to present day.

In form time and in assemblies we explored the legacies of D-Day, as this year marked the 80th anniversary of the landings. The D-Day landings of 6th June 1944 was the largest seaborne invasion in history. As part of our social, moral, spiritual and cultural development we watched sand artist Kseniya Simonova's bring the story of D-Day to life. Finally, in our history lessons we paid tribute to those who sacrificed themselves for our liberty.

# Check out the COVER!

Does it look interesting? What is the title? Who is the author? Is it like books you've tried before?

# Think about the GENRE

This is the type of story found in the book. This could be comedy, adventure or fantasy! What other kinds of stories have you enjoyed?

# TRY it out

Read a few pages of the book. Do you want to know what happens next? It's fine to put it back if it doesn't feel right.

# ASK

...the school librarian, teachers, parents or carers and your friends to recommend a book! The **RIGHT** one

Use the five-finger test to help decide if it's the right book for you. Open the book and read a page. Every time you find a word on the page that you don't know, count one finger. If you get to five, the book is probably too hard, so put it back and try another one.


