



### Universities in Focus

**University in focus... Durham university** 

Established in 1832, Durham University is the third-oldest university in England after Oxford and Cambridge! Durham University was founded by an Act of Parliament and granted a Royal Charter in 1837 by King William IV but the idea of a university in Durham had been discussed as early as the 16th century! The Durham Cathedral Chapter played a vital role in its actual foundation, providing both the endowment (funding) and the buildings. Throughout history, the Church is often linked with education! Durham was initially intended to provide education for Anglican clergy, and it had strong ties to the Church of England and Colleges such as University College (1832) and Hatfield College (1846) were established early on. Durham was also innovative as it began to develop a broader academic curriculum than many other universities! Post-WWII expansion brought more colleges and departments, and the university began admitting more students from diverse backgrounds and in the 1950s and 1960s, it embraced science and modern subjects alongside traditional humanities and theology.

Today, Durham is a collegiate university with 17 colleges and is consistently ranked among the top universities in the UK and globally. It is known for its academic excellence, especially in subjects like theology, history, physics, and law, as well as for its distinctive college system, historic buildings and World Heritage Site status (which includes Durham Cathedral and Castle).





### Universities in Focus

Durham University even holds its graduation ceremonies, known as Congregation, in the historic Durham Cathedral. These ceremonies are scheduled twice a year: in Winter (usually January) and Summer (typically early July). While the ceremonies are held in Durham Cathedral, they are not religious events. Graduates are required to arrive at least 2 hours before the ceremony commences to allow time to be robed and to participate in the procession across Palace Green to the Cathedral, but more recently, for family members who are unable to attend the graduation celebration in person, the ceremonies are even live-streamed online.



Durham University boasts a number of notable alumni across various fields.

Some prominent names include the journalist Jeremy Vine, comedian Nish Kumar, actor Ed Gamble and travel writer Bill Bryson. Some of the most popular courses at Durham University include Law, Psychology, Economics, Business, and Computer Science and these courses often rank highly both nationally and internationally!



We joined our hero Dick Whittington (and his trusty cat!) as he sought fame, fortune and happiness journeying to become Lord Mayor. We were captivated from the start of the ultimate magical pantomime adventure and followed Dick on his journey wondering if he could outwit the evil rodent King Rat and free the city from his team of revolting rodents?

With amazing special effects, stunning sets and beautiful costumes direct from The London Palladium, Dick Whittington was packed with all the traditional pantomime ingredients Stoke audiences know to expect and we were transported on a magical panto adventure like never before!

Students engaged well with this and treated it with maturity and seriousness; provoking discussions that really reflected their empathy and understanding.

We look forward to welcoming you to our new look library soon!



### Out and About.... Y10 OAT STEM CHAMPIONS!!!

For six weeks a group of year 10 students have been working hard, with Higher Horizons, on a project all about sustainable energy, technological development and weather stations. The team had to research a suitable area to develop within a 5-mile radius of their school, using this area to design a sustainable weather station and a educational centre. Hannah, Zach, Olivia, Harry, Georgiana, and Korey worked very hard over the six weeks both in school and at home to research, design, and pitch their educational centre and weather station. As part of the project, students visited three university campuses to learn how these campuses can make use of sustainable energy and to gain a better insight into their future career options regarding STEM.









Students first visited Keele University, for the launch of their project. The team had a campus tour of Keele and saw their solar farm, wind turbines and hub that controls the energy supply for the campus. The hub is continuously monitoring the energy generated by the solar panels and wind turbines, and managing the supply to the campus or back to the National Grid if there is a surplus

For their next visit, students travelled to Harper Adams
University to have a more hands-on day looking at how to
carry out engineering investigations, careers in the
motorsport industry and agricultural applications of STEM. As
part of the motorsport session, students were changing tyres
on a rally car. This task got VERY competitive between the
teams, with them each trying to better each other's times –
the ultimate tyre changing champ was Korey with a time of 1

minute 10!
