Universities in Focus



University in Focus...

The University of Southampton prides itself as one of the leading research universities in the UK, with a rich history that dates back to the 19th century. Originally founded in 1862 as the Hartley Institution, the university began with a generous donation from Henry Robinson Hartley who was a wealthy, local wine merchant and philanthropist from Southampton. He left a substantial sum in his will to establish a centre for learning in the town as he believed that it was important for the local people of the area to have access to higher levels of education. The Hartley Institution opened on 15 October 1862 and was initially intended to provide higher education and cultural opportunities to the people of Southampton.

Universities in Focus

Over the years, the institution evolved, changing names and functions. In 1902 it became the Hartley University College, then in 1919 moved to its current Highfield Campus to accommodate expansion and modern facilities. In 1952 it gained full university status by Royal Charter, becoming the University of Southampton and awarding its own degrees. This marked its formal establishment as an independent university and in the decades following its university status, Southampton expanded rapidly with excellent faculties in engineering, medicine, oceanography, and electronics, among others. It was also a founding member of the Russell Group in 1994, a prestigious association of research-intensive UK universities.

The university is known for key contributions to fields like optical fibre technology, Web science (through the work of Sir Tim Berners-Lee, a visiting professor), and aerospace engineering. Southampton is renowned for its Ocean and Earth Sciences faculty at the National Oceanography Centre, Southampton (NOCS) and is one of the top facilities of its kind in the world. The university also has a strong global presence, with partnerships and campuses overseas, including in Malaysia. It is proud of its diverse student population with tens of thousands of students, from over 130 countries.

Southampton's famous alumni include: Sir Tim Berners-Lee, inventor of the world wide web, who held a visiting professorship at Southampton and collaborated with the university's Web Science Institute, Justine Greening, former UK Secretary of State for Education, and previously Secretary of State for International Development and Sir David Payne, known for ground-breaking work in optical fibre technology, crucial to the development of global telecommunications.

27th June with the grand opening of The Alan Turing Building—a state-of-theart learning facility named in honour of the legendary mathematician and
pioneer of computer science. The building stands as a tribute to Turing's
legacy of brilliance, perseverance, and transformative thinking, qualities the

This purpose-built space features three specialist IT rooms, each equippe with 36 high-spec PCs and 87" touch screen displays, two traditional classrooms, extended canteen space, and modern staff work areas - each element designed to elevate teaching and learning across the school and encourage technological curiosity.

The event was led by Academy Principal Claire Stanyer and Vice Principal Sam Darlington and was attended by a host of distinguished guests, including Sir Ian Dudson, HM Lord-Lieutenant of Staffordshire, who formally opened the building. Joining the celebration were Dr Jason Lines (Chair o Governors), Dave James (Governor), Helena Brothwell (OAT Educatio Director North), and Professor Chris Headleand, Head of the Games Institutet the University of Staffordshire.

Mental Health Week is a time dedicated to highlighting the importance of mental wellbeing and encouraging open, honest conversations about how we're feeling. It's a chance to break down stigma, promote self-care, and ensure that everyone knows where to turn when things get tough.

The 'Ay Up Duck' card — a friendly nod to our local heritage — includes signposting information for students who may be struggling with their mental health. It outlines where they can go for help both within school and through external services, making it clear that no one has to face challenges alone.

At Ormiston Meridian Academy, we are committed to supporting every student's wellbeing. If a student is experiencing difficulties with their mental health, we encourage parents and carers to contact the Pastoral Team. We are able to offer support through the school's Mental Health Support Team (MHST) and other targeted interventions to ensure each student gets the help they need. The duck token is a small but meaningful reminder: you are never alone, and there is always someone ready to listen.
